The We The Action Summit was proof of our community's commitment to our mission to expand access to justice and deliver free legal services where they are critically needed. At the heart of We The Action lies a sentiment beautifully expressed by Melinda Lim, a DC-based lawyer and Summit attendee. She shared with us, "We The Action connects me not only to causes I care about and organizations whose missions I deeply believe in, it connects me to the reason I wanted to be a lawyer in the first place – advocating for those who need their voices heard."

Melinda's words capture the essence of our collective pursuit as lawyers to protect the most vulnerable, fight for justice, and defend our values. The demand for pro bono services has expanded, and in response, we've witnessed an unprecedented and inspiring response from lawyers to meet this need. Since our launch in 2017, We The Action has welcomed over 45,000 lawyers. They've generously contributed their specialized skills and expertise, supporting more than 570 nonprofit organizations tackling the nation's most pressing issues - ranging from ensuring fair elections to addressing immigration, racial justice, and gender equity. Our dedicated volunteers have provided over 285,000 hours of legal services, valued at more than \$122 million in billable hours, to empower high-impact organizations.

At the Summit, Attorney General Eric Holder reminded us that the moral arc of the universe does not bend on its own, but that lawyers have a continued, important role in bending it towards justice. With your ongoing support, I can confidently say that we are bending the moral arc of the universe towards justice for future generations to come. Whether you're a volunteer lawyer, a nonprofit working in your community, or a supporter of our work helping spread the word: Thank you. I am proud to share this report – a reflection of your efforts – with all of you. None of this would be possible without your support.

Inaugural We The Action Summit

In 2023, we hosted our inaugural We The Action Summit – a convening of volunteer lawyers, thought leaders, and nonprofit partners. From panels on the most pressing issues facing the nation to an incredible fireside chat with 82nd Attorney General of the United States Eric Holder and 19th Associate Attorney General of the United States Vanita Gupta, the Summit was a celebration of the power of lawyers to bend the arc of history towards justice.

At the Summit, We The Action lawyers:

- Completed voter suppression research alongside the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights;
- Reviewed immigration case law with VECINA;
- Screened 184 individual cases with the Florida Rights Restoration Coalition to determine if a formerly incarcerated individual is eligible to have their voting rights restored.


















Meet Our Advisory Council

Protecting Democracy

The fight for fair elections and the right to vote is more urgent than ever. Our democracy remains under assault from the Big Lie, harassment of election officials, systematic disenfranchisement of communities of color, and other threats. At We The Action, protecting voting rights and democratic institutions is and always has been the cornerstone of our work since our inception in 2017.

Examples of We The Action's 2023 Democracy Work



Supporting the Largest Nonpartisan Voter **Protection Campaign in the Country**

In 2018, We The Action partnered with the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law in building a bespoke platform to support thousands of lawyers who volunteer to protect the vote on and leading up to Election Day. In 2023 alone, lawyers staffed 1,200 shifts on the 866-OUR-VOTE hotline to support local elections by answering calls from voters.



Elections are highly local, with most important decisions affecting voting access made by state or local governments. We The Action partnered with several organizations, including All Voting is Local, to broaden our local democracy efforts across 24 states (AZ, CA, CO, DC, FL, GA, IL, IN, MA, MD, MI, MN, MO, NC, NH, NJ, NV, NY, OH, OR, PA, TX, VA, and WI). Volunteers researched state laws, confirmed polling locations and election-related dates, and served as poll workers.



Helping Formerly Convicted People **Restore their Rights to Vote**

Since 2020, We The Action has partnered with Florida Rights Restoration Coalition, a 2023 Nobel Peace Prize nominee, to research individual cases to determine if a formerly incarcerated individual is eligible to have their voting rights restored. 500 volunteers from 26 states have researched close to 45,000 cases, including 184 cases during our October Summit.

Protecting Election Officials

In response to increasing threats and harassment against election officials nationwide, We The Action partnered with the Election Official Legal Defense Network. Since 2021, We The Action has recruited over 100 volunteers to support election officials across the country as they face ongoing threats, intimidation, and a deluge of misinformation.



Strengthening Grassroots Democracy Initiatives





Monitoring Legislative Sessions to Stop Anti-Voting Bills

State legislatures have passed a near-record number of new restrictive voting laws this year. Volunteers worked with The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights to identify, monitor, and combat discriminatory voting laws in eleven states. Their efforts involved tracking new legislation in an attempt to prevent restrictive voting laws from passing.



Developing Resources for 2024

State laws that apply to nonprofit advocacy and democracy work are confusing and complex. Since 2022, more than 400 lawyers have donated 1,750 hours to The Democracy Capacity Project to create over 150 different capacity building resources, empowering nonprofits to navigate and conduct advocacy, civic engagement, and Get Out the Vote programs.



Supporting Immigrant Communities

Legal services often make the difference between whether someone is allowed to remain safely in the United States or is deported. One study revealed that immigrants in detention are 10.5x more likely to be allowed to remain in the United States if they are represented by a lawyer.¹ But only 44% of the 5.6 million individuals who appeared in immigration court between 2002 and 2022 had legal representation.² We The Action volunteers are increasing access to legal representation for immigrants.

Reuniting Families & Protecting Children from Deportation

In 2022, a record 152,000 immigrant children were taken into U.S. custody without their parents. The process for reuniting immigrant children with families or sponsors can be heart-breakingly slow. But we know that immigration judges are 100 times more likely to grant relief to unaccompanied children with legal representation than to those without it. In the face of this challenge, We The Action mobilized volunteer lawyers to work with organizations such as Kids in Need of Defense, Safe Passage Project, and VECINA to help children facing deportation reconnect with loved ones in the United States and avoid returning to unsafe living conditions in their home countries. With an army of lawyers, we can ensure that no child appears in immigration court without high quality legal representation.

Welcoming Afghan Allies by Offering **Essential Legal Support**

After the Taliban took control of Afghanistan, thousands found themselves displaced, terrified, and fleeing for safety. Faced with the looming threat in their homeland, many embarked on a perilous journey to the United States. Over the past two years, 18 We The Action partners, including Human Rights First, Doctors Without Borders USA, and the U.S. Committee for Refugees and Immigrants, have aided our Afghan allies in accessing crucial legal support. This year, we enlisted 85 lawyers to bolster their efforts. For Afghans currently within their initial two-year humanitarian parole, urgent reparole applications are essential before their temporary status expires. As these and other intricate deadlines approach, the continued support of volunteers remains imperative.





Helping Immigrants Seeking Safety in the United States

With a backlog of nearly two million asylum seekers waiting for their case to be heard, it can be all but impossible for newly-arrived immigrants to navigate our complicated immigration legal system without the support of a lawyer. Organizations such as Rocky Mountain Immigrant Advocacy Network, NALEO Educational Fund, and Pathways to Citizenship are the first line of defense for these asylum seekers from Haiti, Cuba, El Salvador, Cameroon, and other eligible countries. We The Action volunteer lawyers are preparing asylum seekers for hearings, helping file applications for temporary protected status, and representing them in court proceedings. As one nonprofit shared, these are life and death decisions, and the

Fighting for Reproductive **Freedom and** Gender Equity

Lawyers play a central role in protecting reproductive freedom and advancing gender equity. They advise abortion providers, analyze current and proposed legislation, and increase capacity for domestic violence hotlines and pro bono networks that provide legal information and resources. Through legal expertise and advocacy, We The Action lawyers have been instrumental in dismantling barriers, safeguarding reproductive rights, and championing gender equity for all individuals.

Transgender Law Center

Empowering Trans and Gender Nonconforming People to Assert Their Rights

From facing employment and housing discrimination to dealing with criminalization and violence, transgender and gender nonconforming (TGNC) people often find themselves navigating a legal system not designed with their needs in mind. Since our partnership began in 2017, we have connected 217 volunteers, including pro bono coordinators at law firms and corporate legal departments, to the Transgender Law Center's Attorney Solidarity Network. We The Action volunteers assist in responding to over 1,000 inquiries each year from TGNC individuals across the country, including incarcerated community members, who are seeking legal guidance and assistance in order to assert their rights.



Defending Reproductive Rights and Access to Abortion Care

Since the Supreme Court's Dobbs ruling in 2022, the impact of abortion restrictions and bans has affected people across race, class, and gender identities. In particular, people of color continue to bear the brunt of the harm caused by the lack of protection of sexual and reproductive health rights. In Virginia, volunteers worked with Choice Tracker to draft clear explanations of abortion-related bills to educate Virginians about the state legislature's actions on abortion rights. And, if needed, a task force of volunteers are prepared to work with **Regulatory Assistance for Abortion Providers** to support abortion providers by acting as local counsel in their state.







Supporting Survivors of Gender-based Harassment, Sexual **Assault, and Domestic Violence**

The tragic impact of gender-based violence is inarguable, and 1 in 5 female victims require legal services.³ Working with leading nonprofits in the movement, including TIME'S UP Legal Defense Fund and WomensLaw, We The Action volunteers are increasing capacity at domestic violence hotlines and pro bono networks that provide legal information and resources to survivors. Volunteers are also helping to strengthen survivors' rights by working with Rise to complete a legislative landscape analysis of sexual assault survivors' rights in several states.

Advocating for Racial Justice

Systemic racism permeates every level of the American legal system, and lawyers have a crucial role to play to address these disparities. We The Action's lawyers work every day to bridge the access to justice gap through legal representation, policy advocacy, discrimination case litigation, and supporting community initiatives. By leveraging their legal expertise, lawyers play an essential role in the ongoing fight for racial justice, striving to create a more equitable society for all.

Holding Police Accountable for **Discriminatory Policing Practices**

The murders of Breonna Taylor and George Floyd in 2020 served as yet another wake-up call for many Americans regarding racism in policing. They also emphasized the fact that previous efforts to address discriminatory policing practices have consistently proven inadequate. We The Action lawyers work with the ACLU of Mississippi to combat police misconduct and abuse in one of the poorest areas of the country. With assistance from We The Action's partnership with the law firm O'Melveny & Myers LLP, which has generously contributed over 800 hours to this project, the ACLU of Mississippi filed two separate lawsuits in federal court on behalf of people who had their rights violated by the Lexington Police Department.



Supporting **Criminal Justice Reform**

Severe disparities in the treatment of prisoners are ingrained within criminal justice systems, with disproportionately adverse impacts on Black men. The National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers Return to Freedom Project trains We The Action volunteers to help those serving overly harsh sentences secure clemency, compassionate release, or expungement. We The Action volunteers also work with the #HALTsolitary Campaign to provide representation for people in NY prisons challenging their placement in solitary confinement. This year, such representation supported individuals as they challenged abusive treatment and supported the overall efforts to push for proper implementation of the HALT Solitary Confinement Law.





Fighting for Representation in Government

Friends for more than 20 years, We The Action volunteers Susan Hill and Stephanie Khandeshi helped engage lawmakers and policy experts to pass a federal law expanding the availability of the Plum Book, a key document for ensuring inclusive hiring practices across high-level positions in the federal government. Since 2021, Susan and Stephanie have donated more than 100 hours to Inclusive America, culminating in President Biden signing the PLUM Act into law in 2023. Reforming the Plum Book, which lists more than 9,000 appointed leadership positions in the federal government, could be key to expanding diversity, equity, and inclusion in the federal government.
